# TRACK & FIELD Loughborough

The 130<sup>th</sup> CSAA Championships were held as part of the CSSC Games at Loughborough on an ideal day for competition and viewing. The Men's 100m was won by Tony Noel (IR) (an England Vets International, who in the World Masters T&F Championships in Spain smashed the long standing British M40 100m record in 10.74 to take the World title). He then went on to complete a double by winning the 200m.

Liz Such (HASSRA) completed a middle distance treble by winning the Women's 800m, 1500m & 3000m titles all within the space of a few hours. Dan Samuels (IR) won the men's 800m and 1500m titles. The Men's 5000m had the largest field of the day with 25 competitors.

Other athletes to win two or more titles were Tracey Hilton (HASSRA), Natasha Brunning (HO), Jo Appiah (CE) and Andrew Kruszewski (DTI).

It was a delight to welcome the CSAA President Sir Anthony Battishill and his wife to the Games and they certainly appeared to enjoy the two days of competition.

The athletic officials were of a very high standard and many enjoyed the opportunity to stay over and relax with fellow colleagues and athletes.

The Queenborough Trophy for 2004/05 was retained by Inland Revenue in their very last appearance as a separate Department after a close run battle with HASSRA. The Braben-Whiffen Trophy was won by DTI based on a new formula related to improvement on the previous year by a small Department.

# **VETS TRACK & FIELD Loughborough**

This followed on from the Open Track & Field Championship and the number of entries was higher than in past years, though quite a few failed to turn out on the day for a variety of reasons. However, there were a number of athletes present who had recently returned from the World Masters Championships in Spain, which added an extra element to the competition.

With competitors split into 5-year age groups it was always going to be difficult when it came to awarding medals and/or certificates and this is an area, which certainly requires further consideration in 2006. Despite a heavy shower the meeting was judged a success overall and will be a hard act to follow in 2006.

# **ROAD RELAYS Finsbury Park**

15 Men's teams turned out for the annual Road Relay and a fine race ensued with the lead changing hands a number of times before SPARTA edged ahead on the last lap. There were only 7 Women's team this year but another good race took place with HASSRA coming through to take the honours on the last lap. Interestingly the fastest laps were set by Marc Hobbs and Angela Allen as they brought their respective teams home for gold.

# **CROSS COUNTRY Elmdon**

The Cross Country Championships returned to the Midlands at the Birmingham Association's ground at Elmdon for the second consecutive year. A young Emily Adams carefully tracked the vastly experienced Angela Allen around most of the very good cross country course and then moved away to win her first title with Angela taking the Vets title and leading HASSRA to success in the Open and Vets events. Of the 24 athletes 17 were classified as Veterans 35 and over.

There was a very close race in the Men's event with Marc Hobbs taking the title by 2 seconds from the Vets champion Phil Parry, who had the satisfaction of leading MOD to the Open team title, though HASSRA won the Vets team award. The first two runners were in the same positions in 2004. Of the 84 Men, 45 were in the Vets categories with 20 over 50 years of age! This is a growing trend seen across the country at races on the road and cross country and is worrying for all concerned with the development of athletics, as the youngsters of today do not appear to want to take part in strenuous physical activity. How this can be addressed is something that both the CSAA and CSSC need to seriously consider in the coming months and years.

# **Background to the Sir Sefton-Brancker Representative Matches**

Sir Sefton was killed in the Airship R101 disaster at Beauvais in France in the early hours of 5 October 1930. After his unfortunate death, it was decided that the 3 Associations would jointly provide a Challenge Cup to commemorate Sir Sefton, and to include Track & Field events in addition to the Cross Country race already being held.
